Growing Up:

Born in St. Louis Missouri Faced a lot of racism in her small, Southern town Moved to SF when she was 12

Read all the time to cope with a scary world

Her grandma owned the only black-owned grocery store in town, and Maya spent lots of time there as a child

Her most famous book, "I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings," is about growing up very poor with her grandmother, how books helped her, and the power of words
